Since 2000, Chris has served as Director and then Vice President of Programs at The Healing Place. He is an adjunct faculty member with the Department of Social Work at North Carolina State University, where he teaches "Addiction Recovery and Social Work Practice." He received his B.A. in Psychology in 1993 from the University of Rhode Island and his Master of Social Work in 2000 from East Carolina University. He has lived in North Carolina since 1994 and has worked for Charter Northridge Hospital, Holly Hill/Charter Hospital, Wake County Human Services, and Dorothea Dix Hospital.

The Healing Place of Wake County is a non-profit 501 (c) (3) recovery and rehabilitation facility for homeless people with alcohol and other drug dependency. The Men's Facility opened its doors in 2001, and the Women's Facility began operation in 2006. During its operation, The Healing Place has provided more than 450,000 beds of shelter to homeless men and women. The nonprofit has also provided thousands of recovery classes and meetings. Remarkably, over 65% of the graduates from the program, with a year of post-discharge sobriety, are still sober. The Healing Place of Wake County is built on the principles of the highly successful Healing Place in Louisville KY, which received the 1998 US Department of Health Resources and Service Administration "Models That Work Award" in recognition of the success of the program.
